Nonprofit Organizations

<u>Problem Statement</u>: The Rhode Island Foundation (RI Foundation) surveyed nonprofit organizations in March 2020 and found that most experienced direct revenue losses due to reduced programming, client payments, and/or reimbursement for services. In September 2021, the Grantmakers Council of Rhode Island conducted a survey to understand the challenges facing nonprofit organizations and the communities they serve. Key findings included:

- 75% of respondents started new programs in response to the pandemic, yet 73% did not reduce pre-pandemic programming.
- 59% of respondents believed that demand for services would continue increasing as government relief programs ended.
- The most pressing challenges were financial (64%), staffing (55%), and organizational capacity (53%).¹

<u>Project Overview</u>: RI Foundation provided general operating grants to 240 nonprofit organizations that work to address food insecurity, housing instability and homelessness prevention, and behavioral health needs. Applicants had to be an I.R.C. § 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization based in Rhode Island or have a fiscal sponsor/agent based in Rhode Island. Nonprofit hospitals, educational institutions, and foundations were ineligible.



Notes: A single audit fee applies to all State Fiscal Recovery Fund projects and accounts for \$6,000 of the planned and actual expenditures shown in the above table.



1. Number of nonprofits served




2. Percentage of nonprofits given grants to address behavioral health needs







3. Percentage of nonprofits given grants to address food insecurity




4. Percentage of nonprofits given grants to address housing instability and homelessness prevention






5. Percentage of nonprofits given grants that address needs in more than one area



6. Percentage of dollars awarded to nonprofits operating in Qualified Census Tracts



² The original key performance indicator agreed to by the Rhode Island Foundation was to measure the percentage of nonprofits that had decreased challenges from the pandemic after receipt of the grant. The baseline for this KPI was 0% and the KPI was a positive measure indicting the percentage of nonprofits that had decreased challenges from the pandemic after receipt of the grant. The goal for this measure was 60%. The data reported to the Pandemic Recovery Office (PRO) by the Rhode Island Foundation, however, matched organization pre- and post-responses and calculated the percentage of organizations that did not report continued economic challenges at the end of the award period. PRO interpreted that to be the comparative measure for the original KPI.




9. Percentage of nonprofits awarded grants that continue operations for the full duration of the award $period^3$
