<u>Problem Statement</u>: Homelessness in Rhode Island increased significantly during the pandemic, according to the annual Rhode Island Point in Time Counts. Between 2021 and 2023, the study found that the number of people experiencing homelessness increased by 43%, the number of people in emergency shelters increased by 48%, and the number of people living outdoors increased by 85%.<sup>1</sup>

<u>Project Overview</u>: In response to this crisis, the Rhode Island Department of Housing (Department) initiated programs that increased homelessness prevention, diversion, and rapid rehousing services; provided emergency shelter through warming stations and temporary seasonal shelters; provided housing stabilization services; and developed and implemented systemwide programs to provide innovative solutions to housing issues.

The entities providing services were Amos House, Blackstone Valley Advocacy Center, Catholic Social Services of Rhode Island, Community Care Alliance, Crossroads Rhode Island, Domestic Violence Resource Center of South County, East Bay Community Action Program, Elizabeth Buffum Chace Center, Foster Forward, Harvest Community Church, Haus of Codec, House of Hope Community Development Center, Lucy's Hearth, Open Doors RI, Rhode Island Coalition to End Homelessness, Sojourner House, Thrive Behavioral Health, Tri-County Community Action Agency, Turning Around Ministries, Washington Square Services, and Westerly Area Rest Meals.

The intended outcome was to ensure that individuals and families experiencing homelessness had access to a safe place to stay and appropriate services to move forward in finding permanent supportive housing.

<u>Financial Overview</u>: All program payments can be found on the <u>Pandemic Recovery Office's</u> <u>website</u> by filtering the "Project" box for "Homelessness Assistance Phase II." The project did not utilize its full appropriation of \$10.7 million with \$65,955 of unexpended funds remaining at the conclusion of the project. 
